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


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Land Acknowledgement







All students have equitable access to programs, services, resources, and spaces.






Message from Julia Allworth, Manager of Innovation Projects





Growth Through Work-Integrated Learning



Support for a valuable work-integrated learning experience is built into the Innovation Hub. We believe that when meaningful training and coaching is provided to all team members, they can do their best work and have a great learning experience. Our goal is to ensure that all student employees gain valuable work experience and learn transferable skills that will help them in their future careers.

How we Support our Student Employees

Design Thinking Workshops

Each week, our teams come together as a large group to participate in full team workshops and training that includes topics such as equity-centered design thinking, data collection, storytelling, presentation skills and more.



Learning Journey Coaching

Each team member participates in our Your Learning Journey coaching program where they identify competencies they'd like to work on in 1:1 coaching sessions with their Team Lead in areas of personal development, interpersonal, workplace, and technical skills related to their job.



Team Meetings & Co-Works

Each team meets several times per week inperson over their work term. Our Community
Engagement Team facilitates large group events
designed to augment the Your Learning Journey
program through activities such as escape rooms,
mystery simulations, shark tank pitches, and more!

events for team members to get to know each
other and have fun.

Our Approach to Design Research



We are grateful for our partners across the university's three campuses who provide meaningful design research challenges for our student teams. Our design-thinking research seeks to gather deep insight on the people impacted by programs, services, spaces, and other challenges at the university to better understand their needs. We take an equity-centered approach to research, taking strides to elevate the voices of equity-deserving students.

Background Research

At the beginning of any new design project, our teams conduct a thorough environmental scan and academic literature review to educate themselves about the topic and the project partner.



Understanding Bias

We work as a team and on an individual level to become aware of our biases that will impact the outcomes of our design research. Each team engages regularly with reflection questions to help them notice their biases and reflect on the impact they have on the research process.



Empathy-Based Data Collection

We use long-form ethnographic interviews techniques to conduct 1-on-1 or group feedback sessions. These sessions allow participants to share their stories and experiences. Depending on the goal of the projects, we incorporate interactive reflective activities within these sessions to better understand participant experiences and perspectives.

Co-Creation & User Experience Design

We host group brainstorming and co-creation events to involve and encourage participants to give feedback and ideate suggestions based on collected data about the U of T community's experiences and perspectives. For some projects, we employ user experience data collection methods such as observation and immersive experiences to gather data about participant journeys and processes.



Insight-Driven Data Analysis

Grounded analytic techniques are the predominant approach to data analysis which allow new information to emerge from the data. Our teams are trained to look for insights in the data, particularly in the form of themes that speak to people's values and un-met needs.



Bringing the Data to Life

When sharing our data with project partners and the community, our goal is inspiration for design. We seek to honour the stories told to us, and present them in a visionary way that gives hope for future possibilities. We create a data-driven vision and design principles for each final report, and share stories using personas, journey maps, and story moments to humanize the data.



Peer-to-Peer Research Model




Our design research relies on a peer-to-peer feedback model. Everything in the Innovation Hub has been designed intentionally to ensure students (both those who work at the Innovation Hub and those who share their stories with us as data), have a great experience. Our goal is to design with rather than for students, and we are proud of the trust that we've built with students over the years in our commitment to have ethical research practices.

Only Students in the Space

We also avoid having any faculty and/or staff in the room while we are meeting with students. This is a practice that we started during our work gathering feedback in support of the Presidential and Provostial Task Force on Student Mental Health, and have carried it forward in all our work.






Well-Documented Research Process

Over the years, we have compiled a well-documented research process guide and provide extensive training for students on our process which we refine each year for continuous improvement and based on both student and partner feedback.





This year, we listened to in-depth stories & experiences of **290 students** and **33 faculty & staff**













Innovation Hub Projects 2023-24



This year, we saw demand for our design thinking research grow as our teams had the opportunity to work on a wide range of meaningful projects.

What Matters to U of T Students?

Looking at student stories and data collected over the last three years

(2020-2023), we sought to explore the question: what matters to U of T students now? Our team reviewed research reports and over 380 pieces of qualitative data. We found that, when students feel secure exploring their identities, they feel more connected to the university community. Our aim is to bring expertise, empathy, and in-depth understanding of what matters most to U of T students towards co-creating a university that works for everyone.

University of Toronto Quality Assurance Process

The Innovation Hub supported departments at the Faculty of Arts

& Science in the student consultation for reviews of their academic programs based on the University of Toronto Quality Assurance Process (UTQAP) criteria. Ensuring students receive the best experience in their academic programs, sharing their experience of their programs is an important aspect of this review process. The teams worked in partnership with 10 departments to support their student consultation, with a focus on introducing equity-related topics into the feedback process.

Trans & Nonbinary Student Experience

In partnership with the Sexual & Gender Diversity Office, the Innovation Hub built on previous project findings to understand the experiences of trans and non-binary students (TNB). The data collected will amplify TNB student voices in an accessible way while bridging the gap to student-facing staff and faculty who wish to better understand their experiences.

Experiences of Students Who Are Also Parents


In partnership with Family Care Office, the Innovation Hub explored

the needs of students who are also parents as they navigate their multiple roles and responsibilities while studying. The data collected will inform future programs and services for student parents at the University of Toronto.

Sport & Rec: Expanding Access



In partnership with Sport & Rec, the Innovation Hub continued last year's collaboration to reimagine programs, services, and spaces through co-creation and student feedback with a particular focus on beginner programming. The data collected will inform the future of Sport & Rec offerings, prioritizing greater inclusion of students from equity-deserving populations.



Innovation Hub Projects 2023-24





International Foundation Program – Quick Student Consultation

In partnership with the International Foundation Program (IFP) at New College, the Innovation Hub investigated IFP students' perception on equity, diversity, inclusion, and social justice over two sessions. The focus of the project of the inclusion of equity-deserving groups in IFP course materials impacts students' learning.



Re-imagining Commuter Students Spaces

Creating welcoming spaces for commuter students is crucial

for fostering a sense of belonging on the St. George Campus. In partnership with Spaces & Experiences, the Innovation Hub's Design Research team explored the needs of commuter students, particularly students from equity-deserving populations to make design decisions for future spaces and modifications to existing spaces.



Centre for Entrepreneurship – Quick Student Consultation

In partnership with the Faculty of Arts & Science Centre for Entrepreneurship, the Innovation Hub explored students' understanding of what entrepreneurship means to them and the entrepreneurial mindset.




International Students First 48 Hours in Canada


International students enrich the University of Toronto with

their diverse perspectives and experiences. In partnership with the Office of the Vice-Provost, International, the Innovation Hub's Design Research team identified 8 diverse international students to document their first 48 hours in Canada. Using video diaries, the students documented their experiences in real time. Data collected will help build a better understanding of what it is like for international students when they first arrive in Canada.




In partnership with the Faculty of Information (iSchool) Office of the Registrar and Student Services, the Innovation Hub sought direct input about programs, initiatives, and services at the iSchool. The aim of the consultation focused on areas of strength and improvement in the faculty for future quality improvement of students' experiences.













Innovation Hub Projects Come to Life




Our work aims to humanize and drive change. This past year, we saw some of our projects enact changes in their departments, divisions, and broad U of T community to improve student experiences.

First 48 Hours

The Innovation Hub worked closely with the Office of the Vice-President International and Centre for International Experience to create a documentary titled *International Students: First 48 Hours in Canada*. The documentary shares the stories of seven international students as they reflect on their earliest experiences arriving and adapting to life in Canada to embark on their studies. We welcomed Senior Leaders and staff to our co-working space to pre-screen the documentary to immerse themselves in the stories of our students.







Food Services - Access Meal Plan

In Winter 2022, the Innovation Hub partnered with Spaces & Experiences to support meaningful student consultations that help co-design the future of Food Services operations as Chestnut. The dining hall operational model has changed to meet student needs during the COVID-19 pandemic. Coming in Fall 2024, Food Services is implementing the Access Meal Plans to provide students with convenience and flexibility that meets individual's own unique meal needs.

Sport & Rec

Our findings from the Diversity in Movement: Expanding Access at Sport & Rec (2023) enabled Sport & Rec to embed some of the Inovation Hub's recommendations into their strategic goals for Equity, Diversity, Inclusion & Belonging.

For Example:

- Aquatic and Instructed Sport was re-designed to include shorter sessions and drop-in lesson programs such as Trans Swim Lessons
- More program offers for "Swim to Survive" and Family Inclusive Aquatics
 Program were implemented to better support student parents
- New intramural and drop-in sport collaborations on entry-level pathways and recreational sports were implemented to support beginners
- A new dedicated and expanded Outdoor Recreation portfolio was created to support student mental health



Connecting with the Community



This year, we collaborated with groups across campus, in Toronto, and beyond, to introduce students and others to design thinking and our work.

Alternative Reading Week

In partnership with the Centre for Community Partnerships, the Innovation Hub invited students to participate in 3-days of design activities to understand the question: what makes an inclusive workplace?






Therapy Dogs


Equity, Diversity, Inclusion & Access at the School of the Environment

In partnership with the School of the Environment (the School) at the Faculty of Arts & Science, the Innovation Hub's design research team seeks to learn how equity, diversity, inclusion, and access (EDIA) is embedded in the School's curriculum, programming, communications, hiring, events, spaces, processes, and culture, and to understand where gaps exist. The goal of this project is to gain meaningful student perspectives to identify tangible ideas for steps to take to better champion EDIA at the School, focusing on supporting enhanced student experiences.



Engagment & Belonging for Students with Disabilities


In partnership with Accessibility Services, the Innovation Hub's design research team seeks to understand factors that enable students with disabilities to fully engage in campus life outside of the classroom and to learn where gaps exist. The goal of the project is to gain a meaningful understanding of student perspectives and tangible ideas of steps to take to better champion access and inclusion so that students with disabilities can fully engage with events, activities, programming, social activities, and other aspects of campus life.



Reception Experiences at Health & Wellness

In partnership with Health & Wellness (H&W), the Innovation Hub will look at all possible interactions including virtual and in person at various points in time to uncover opportunities to improve reception experiences. The goal of this project is to create consistent student experiences with H&W's reception, whether it be a first encounter as a new patient or repeat encounter as a returning patient.








Looking Ahead to the Future





Family Friendly U of T



The Innovation Hub continues its partnership with the and Family Care Office to synthesize learnings from several years of design research to explore how to create a more family-friendly university. This year, we aim to create a 'mini-site' of resources embedded with the Family Care Office website that focuses on helping staff, faculty, and student leaders at U of T to become more family-friendly in their day-to-day practices.

International Students: Life After Graduation



In partnership with the Office of the Associate Vice-President, International Student Experience and Centre for International Experience, the Innovation Hub seeks to identify a diverse group of 6 international alumni willing to share their recent experiences after graduation using video diaries, voiceovers, and vlogs. The goal of this project is to discover the diverse pathways and opportunities that international students pursue after graduation from the University of Toronto and to highlight recent graduates' perspectives.

Faculty of Arts & Science Partnership to support the University of Toronto Quality Assurance Project



The Innovation Hub will support 9 units at the Faculty of Arts & Science in the student consultation for reviews of their academic programs based on the University of Toronto Quality Assurance Process (UTQAP).


